

### **Definition**

**Loneliness** is the feeling of being alone or living alone, regardless of the amount of social contact.<sup>1</sup>

**Social isolation** is a lack of social connections. Social isolation can lead to loneliness in some people, while others can feel lonely without being socially isolated.<sup>1</sup>

## Health Risks of Loneliness and Social Isolation

Social isolation and loneliness may increase the risk of physical and mental conditions, such as high blood pressure, heart disease, obesity, a weakened immune system, anxiety, depression, cognitive decline, Alzheimer's disease, and even death.<sup>2</sup>

# Who is at Risk of Loneliness and Isolation?

Older adults who find themselves unexpectedly alone due to:

- Death of a spouse or partner
- · Separation from friends or family
- Retirement
- · Loss of mobility or independence
- · Getting ill and becoming dependent on others
- · Having multiple chronic health problems
- · Having no children or no contact with family
- · Living with low income
- · Changing family structure
- Being left behind by younger people migrating for work<sup>3</sup>

# How to Address Loneliness and Social Isolation in the Elderly

- > Engaging in activities in a local or religious community
- > Becoming a volunteer in some organization or working voluntarily
- > Engaging in social activities with other seniors or colleagues
- > Following an active lifestyle
- Taking up an old hobby or a new one to stay occupied and prevent negative thinking
